ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING PROGRAM By Taffy Geith

The Riverside Branch of AAUW met on Friday, November 11, at the Community Room of Habitat for Humanity for their general meeting. Jennifer O'Farrell, Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force Director and Director of Operation SafeHouse for Riverside County, presented an overview of the system and goals of the three hundred members of the two Task Forces. They were originally funded by the 2010 California Emergency Management Fund, but now include the Riverside County Sheriff's Dept., The Riverside County District Attorney, US Homeland Security, and the organization called Million Kids. They have three main goals: protect, prevent, and prosecute.

The cooperative efforts of these groups have developed what they call "wrap-around services." They collect information, establish training, the County District Attorney prosecutes cases, The Federal Homeland Security can cross state lines (if necessary), the County Sheriff's Office helps to identify victims, and the Organization Million Kids has specifically trained observers. Operation SafeHouse helps the victims become survivors and provides a safe haven for runaways.

Ms. O'Farrell defined two kinds of trafficking: Labor trafficking and Sex trafficking. Labor trafficking involves force, fraud, coercion and kidnapping (rarely); sex trafficking uses fraud, and now more often, on-line abduction, (which is harder to detect). She presented two case studies -- one for each type of trafficking with photos of the real victims and true details of their lives. These stories were sad and heart breaking for those attending, perhaps more so, because they were children from our own county.

Victims of sex trafficking have various methods of making money for their masters: peddling, carnivals, nail salons, organ removal (kidney), and prostitution. Victims of labor trafficking work in nail shops, massage parlors, sweat shops, or field crops. Conditions that victims (better called "psychological prisoners") live with are torture, confinement, threats of violence, starving, rape, gang rape, drugs, and love relationships. (Young prostitutes often call their abductors, Daddy.)

Ms. O'Farrell said that sex trafficking is a thirty-two billion dollar industry worldwide. She said the US has the distinction of being one of the top three destination drops. (California, Florida, Nevada, New York and Ohio lead among the states.) 2.8 million children live on the street each year and one-third of those will be picked up for a sex act. The average age of a prostitute is 13. The phone number for the National Human Trafficking Resource Center is 1-888-3737-888 which connects directly to Law Enforcement.

She ended with a reminder that "Stuff the Bus" will be taking donations for SafeHouse on November 17th at the Riverside Plaza at the Regal Theater. SafeHouse helps victims with legal assistance, medical treatment, and ways to rebuild their lives and, importantly, their trust. Too, it offers help with emancipated foster youth who need temporary space while adjusting to living on their own.

This report does not do justice to the outstanding, substantive presentation of a very current and difficult social problem that we and surrounding counties face. Ms. O'Farrell was clear and frank in her language, but always expressed a depth of feeling and understanding that made her listeners thankful to have such a positive person working with children in trouble. We are more aware and alert and better citizens because of the knowledge she shared.

We concluded our meeting by joining the line-up for the delicious and plentiful buffet lunch provided by Jo Turner, Membership Co-Chair. Eating good food always promotes conversation and a chance to discuss and catch up with other members and to greet the many guests we had . A good morning for the Riverside Branch of AAUW.
