The topics for 2016 are:

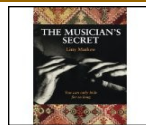

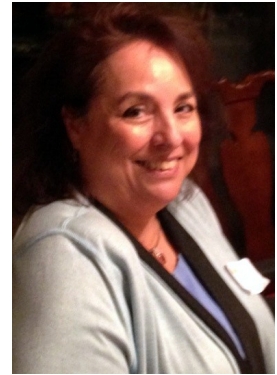

As you may know, last year was AAUW National's first year to expand Tech Trek to states outside of California. The pilot program in other states was very successful and AAUW National has agreed to assist with implementing Tech Trek. One (positive) change is donations will be made to AAUW National directly instead of the Special Funds Program (SPF). Donations remain tax-deductible, but Tech Trek camps will no longer be charged a processing fee. This means more of the money is making it to the camps! Another change is that National is looking to move a lot of the girl selection process online. This will reduce the cost to branches. Typically, local branches are responsible for the printing and mailing costs of selecting girls. All in all, AAUW National is looking to improve and streamline Tech Trek.

Dr. David Hansen, General Meeting

The Community Room of Habitat for Humanity, was the gathering place for the Riverside Branch of AAUW at 10:00 AM on Thursday, November 19, 2015.

President, Barb Ryon, welcomed members and guests and introduced our speaker, Dr. David Hansen, Superintendent of Riverside Unified School District. Barb was pleased to inform us that Dr. Hansen, new to the Tech Trek Program we support, offered to help its funding, which delighted us all. He also became a member of our AAUW Branch.

Dr. Hansen showed a photo of the present School Board of RUSD mentioning their names, -- noting that all are native to Riverside except one.

First, some facts about RUSD. It is the sixteenth largest district in California -- considered a "major player" in the state, has a budget of \$450 million, has 5,000 employees, with 66% of students living in poverty (they qualify for free or reduced price lunch), 40 different languages spoken -- the largest being Spanish (Latinos are our largest sub group), and covers an area 92 square miles. Riverside has one other district, Alvord, partially in the city, but is separate from RUSD. What drives everything, Dr. Hansen said, is "hope for the future, by being engaged in the present.

The recession of 2008 caused a host of problems for education in Riverside. The loss of teachers was the greatest concern. (21,000 teachers will be needed in California in the next five years.) Another loss was to the budget -- \$100 million was cut and we are still 20 % short of a fully funded budget. (The bulk of budget goes to people.) Further consequences are our old and aging facilities. Riverside has not passed a bond issue in 30 years, however new growth is expected in the Lake Matthews and Orange Grove areas with projected new enrollments -- perhaps meaning new facilities. Naturally, we are aware of the savings we generate by being energy and water efficient.

Common Core (much discussed) refers to the state standards in language arts and math that each student should know and be able to do from K through grade 12. Presently, 6 out of 10 freshmen need remedial teaching when they begin college. The new common core standards are aligned so that students are "college ready." We will test in grades 3 through 11 using tests that are in line with what they're doing in school.

The California High School exit exam has ended by order of Governor Brown. The Advanced Placement Test is still here and allows students to take college level classes while in High School and pass the requisite exams which will give them college credit and apply to their grade status and boost their college readiness. RUSD has 6,000 students in Special Education classes which requires \$75 million. There are lots of levels in this category ranging from the lowest (30 minutes of speech therapy a week) to the highest level which is Sunshine School (full day) for children with severe physical and mental handicaps.

Dr. Hansen made note of RUSD's expansion in technical integration and infrastructure. The STEM Academy is now temporarily housed at Hyatt Elementary. Plans are considered for a High School to be situated next to the UCR campus where the curriculum will allow students to graduate with an AA Degree. Innovative programs are already in place, example: dual emersion in classrooms with half English and half Spanish Instruction -- all students become bilingual.

Dr. Hansen stated that more computers are need -- presently, one for every 4 students. He also cited his great concern for the need for trained counselors -- both in academics as well as in social, emotional areas. All schools have a campus supervisor for safety. Because of time constraints (other meetings to attend), this is but a brief summary of the needs and considerations that Dr. Hansen spoke of for the future of RUSD.

Dr. Hansen had a short time for Q and A. Members asked why California Schools are unequal in many respects (class size, librarians, support staff) to schools on the East Coast? He responded by saying that California spends about \$1,500 per student (from August to June) while many schools on the East Coast spend as much as \$22,000 per student. California is 48th in the nation in "per pupil" spending. Inequality in education exists across the country.

President, Barb Ryon, thanked him for his informative and enlightening presentation and presented him with a gift. Those in attendance were very appreciative of his knowledge and his honest portrayal of our own Riverside Unified School District.

(General Meeting continued)

Following Dr. Hansen's departure, a meeting was called for the AAUW members in attendance.

Secretary, Barbara Purvis, asked those members present to review the minutes of the last meeting. A motion was made and then passed to accept them.

Barbara introduced two guests from AmeriCorps, Linda Toro and Jessica Gonzalez-Lopez. Both are juniors at UCR and work at Highland Elementary. They assist students who are at the lower levels of achievement in literacy and math, and also help middle level students to progress from proficiency to advanced levels. They expressed much that they liked about what they were doing. A member suggested that the homeless children in the Family Shelter need their help. They said they are expanding to RCC and to Cal Baptist and will be going to summer day camps across the City.

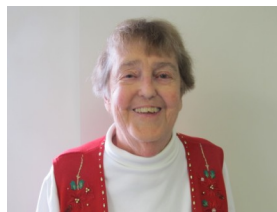

9 OUT OF 10 COLLEGES REPORT ZERO RAPES IN 2014

AAUW analyzed new crime data which revealed 91 percent of U.S. colleges disclosed zero reported cases of rape in 2014. We know that sexual assault is unfortunately common on college campuses, with nearly one in four women experiencing sexual violence. The low reporting numbers are likely an indicator that victims did not feel comfortable reporting the assault. Research tells us that survivors are often ashamed to come forward and fear retaliation if they do. In an ABC Interview, AAUW's Vice President of Government Relations Lisa Maatz stressed that schools that report zero rapes are not necessarily safer, but may in fact have reason to re-examine their policies for barriers to such reports. She also stressed that we should encourage schools to collect and use better data to help create more effective prevention programs and better protect students from sexual assault.

STUDENTS FIGHT BACK AGAINST MANDATORY ATHLETIC FEES THAT ADD TO STUDENT DEBT

Many of our county's largest public universities require mandatory student fees to fund college athletic departments. These fees are buried on long and complex tuition bills and charge hundreds of dollars to each student, including those who will never participate in sports or set foot in stadiums. There is legitimate concern that such fees are contributing to America's spiraling student debt problem. Students at schools across the country are protesting.

AAUW CHEER OF THE WEEK

Defense Secretary Ashton Carter announced no job in the United States military will be denied based on gender, opening the door for women to hold combat jobs. This decision will open up about 220,000 jobs when implemented.
