

#### **JODIE HOLT**

Members of the Riverside Branch of AAUW came together for their April 17 meeting at Habitat for Humanity, 2180 Iowa Avenue at 9:30 am.

Barb Ryon, co-president, extended a warm welcome to members and guests present and conducted the election of officers for next year Jo Turner, president emeritus, came forward to remind us again, that women are fifty-one percent of the population, but have yet to get equal pay for equal work or equal representation in government. This, even though, AAUW has been advocating for equality for 132 years. Jo provided a brief but definitive report on areas that have concern for us.

Jo introduced our guest speaker, Dr. Jodie Holt of UCR, an Associate Dean, Agriculture and-Natural Resources and Cooperative Extension. Jodie graduated from the University of Georgia and got her PhD. at UC Davis. Her special field is weedy and invasive plant species, and she is also known for her consulting work on the film, Avatar. Jodie was the contact person for the Avatar film maker.

Jodie's time (and fame) with the film, Avatar, has given her many opportunities to connect with young people. Jodie cites the study of science as essential in order to have an educated public that can solve human and environmental problems. Botany is the study of plants. Plants matter -- they produce all of the oxygen, are the sources of goods, medicines, paper, wood, and serve as habitats for wild life. Further, Botany concerns itself with protecting the environment, global warming, and pollution. (Some plants threaten the environment -- she cited the giant reeds down at the river bottom and the kudzu that is found in Georgia and other southern states.) Jodie encourages girls to be scientists. Lots of girls get a bachelor's degree in Botany, fewer go to graduate school, and fewer, still, go into graduate leadership roles. When she speaks to girls, she suggests that they ask themselves these questions: What do you like ---dislike? What do you want to know about? Who do you admire? (Girls want to be liked.) Jodie loved plants and loved math. Her match teacher inspired her. She wanted to learn all about plants — consequently, she loves her job. She does research, teaches, studies and mentors students.

Jodie stated that another reason for the importance of teaching about plants is that many of us have "plant blindness". To illustrate this she showed several slides and asked us what we saw? Example: a panda in a dead tree with greenery all around. Everyone saw the panda but not the bamboo behind it. We often are unable to see plants in our own environment. She said that with our visual system, ten million bits of information pass before our eyes every second, but we only process 16 of them. The film, Avatar, cures plant blindness because of the lush landscape of the rainforest — botany is embedded in the film. The film artists and designers drew illustrations of the unusual plants of this unique rainforest and Jodie wrote the descriptions of this flora of the planet Pandora using Latin nomenclature and basing the information on her botanic knowledge. She gave an example of her words, "signal transduction" -- meaning how cells communicate. She showed many slides comparing the Pandora plant with an example of an earth plant that is similar to it and how she made the botanic description. Words here cannot convey the excitement and artistic beauty of the Pandora plants and the earth plants. A book

was published, <u>An Activist Survival Guide</u>, which has become well known and is a recruitment tool for many University Botany Departments. There is now a video game, an action figure and even a Treetop Barbie. Avatar is the highest grossing movie of all time, and Jodie made a significant contribution to its success.

Sigourney Weaver, star of Avatar, could not have selected a better model for a field botanist than Dr. Jodie Holt. Dr. Holt is truly gifted and this was an informative and fascinating presentation. She convinced us that science is critical for solving problems and that science, art and technology can reach audiences in many ways. We gained so much knowledge as well as love and appreciation of plants —too, we know that the students in her classes are very fortunate.

# You should have already received directions from both the National Organization and the California State by e-mail. You can vote on line in both elections. But first you may need to study up on both the candidates and the issues you will need to vote on.

For the State, if you click HERE, you can find all the information on the candidates and the issues. To vote you will need your National ID number which is on the back of your copy of "Outlook" which was sent earlier in April. If you don't have a computer, you can call (916) 448-7795 and ask for a hard copy to be sent to you. The deadline to vote in the State Election is May 11th. Currently there are eight director vacancies. If the proposed bylaws amendment to reduce the size of the board (see below) passes, the four top vote-getting candidates will become directors. Other ballot items are the proposed Public Policy Priorities for 2013-15, a bylaws amendment to reduce the size of our Board of Directors, and a proposal to increase our annual membership dues.

When you are ready to vote on line, you will need both your ID number and your voter PIN number which are both on the back of your "Outlook." If you don't have a computer, you can call 800.326.2289 and ask for a hard copy. The National Election deadline is June 10th.

### THE CENTER FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE & CIVIL LIBERTIES

On April 24th AAUW members enjoyed an **Out & About** tour of the newly renovated and restored Citrus Belt Savings & Loan Building which is now home to The Riverside Community College District's **Center for Social Justice & Civil Liberties** located at 3855 Market Street, Riverside. Best known for its collection of the art work and humanities collection of Riverside Community College alumna **Mine Okubo**, whose works played a significant role in documenting the history of Japanese Americans in the United States including her own experiences in an internment camp during WW II in Utah. The Center is a testament to Riverside's commitment to honor its multicultural history.

The first floor exhibition entitled *Riverside Stories* highlights the good and the bad side of Riverside's social justice and civil rights history through the stories of seven residents: **The Harada family**, who challenged the *Alien Land Act* in the courts on behalf of their American born children; **Frank Johnson**, who fought to integrate a public swimming pool in the 1920s; Native American **Rupert Costo**, Riverside Community College alum, who went to Washington, D.C. to fight for tribal water rights and with his wife, Jeannette Costo, were prominent national leaders in the fight for the economic and social rights for Native Americans; **John Sotelo**, the first Mexican American to be elected to Riverside's city council, worked to secure equal treatment for minority groups by ensuring representation in city government and securing community facilities for underserved neighborhoods; **Thomas Rivera**, an author, migrant rights supporter and educator who became the first Mexican American chancellor of UC Riverside, first in the UC system; **Frank Miller**, original owner of the Mission Inn and stalwart supporter of civil rights. The first floor also houses the Digital Media Resource Center which holds a repository of video, film, photographs and personal documents for more in depth study of Riverside's significant cultural history.

The second floor houses the rich and varied works of Mine Okuba who over her lifetime experimented with cubism, charcoal drawings, watercolor and tempera to ink on paper. As viewers of the vast collection (8,000 pieces of art, professional papers and personal memorabilia), a large portion of which is still being archived, one is struck by the breadth of her artistic ability to change styles and mediums.

The Center also houses a temperature controlled archive and storage room complete with a scholar workroom for visiting scholars, graduate students and experts who wish to pursue a more in-depth understanding and further development of Mine's vast collection. Through NEA grants graduate students are welcomed to further develop Mine's collection.

The Center can only be seen through pre-arranged visits by calling or contacting the center at (951) 222-8846 or socialjustice@rccd.edu. There are also opportunities for support and named gifts (naming the building, a floor level, etc...) if you wish to contribute towards supporting the exhibitions and operations of the Center through the RCCD Foundation (951-222-8627 or rccd.edu/foundation). #### 2013-14 California Legislative Session

The California Public Policy Committee has studied and reviewed 89 bills, as the first step to the AAUW CA Public Policy committee adoption of a Bill package, but has now whittled the bill package down to a more manageable 25 Bills. Watch the Public Policy section of the California website (HERE) for more information

To check on the status of these bills, the details on bills can be found by looking at the AAUW California online bill tracking system (HERE). In addition to the report showing tracked bills and AAUW-CA positions on the bills, clicking on the bill number will direct you to the bill page, where bill language, analysis, votes and letters can be found. Clicking on the bill Author's name will show information on the Author.

With this online system, bill changes are updated daily.

For critical bills where the Legislature needs to hear from AAUW California members, Action Alerts will be utilized. If you do not receive our Action Alerts now a good time to sign up. (Click **HERE**).
