

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

The Riverside Branch will be having two very important meetings. The first is the Tech Trek brunch on September 17th, and the second is a luncheon celebrating 100 years of the right for women to vote in California on, October 28th.

This *Pipeline* will have more information on the Tech Trek brunch, but I want to emphasize the importance of this meeting to the success of Tech Trek for our branch.

The Riverside Branch was able to send five girls to the science camp this past summer at UC at San Diego. We have just received notice that the cost per girl will increase to \$850, and that will still not cover the estimated cost. Reservations from the branches for the 2012 Tech Trek camps are due at the State AAUW by mid-October.

Hopefully you will be able to attend the brunch and bring a check with you. If you cannot attend, please considering sending a donation for Tech Trek. Any amount helps, especially if we can all give something. The checks should be made payable to *AAUW CA SPF* (or *AAUW California Special Projects Fund*) with the memo line indicating "Tech Trek for Riverside Branch". The checks should be mailed to our treasurer, Barb Ryon.

Although women in the United States did not receive the right to vote until the ratification of the 19th Amendment in 1920, California women were granted the right to vote on *October 10, 1911*, The Riverside Branch together with the League of Women Voters of Riverside and California Women Lead will be holding a California Suffrage Centennial Celebration Luncheon on October 28, 2011 at the Riverside Convention Center starting at 11:30 am. This should be a very informative and interesting meeting and hopefully you will all come and bring a friend or two or three.

Following the lead of the National Organization, the State Board voted to implement a new procedure for voting. A private contracting firm will be used to handle the voting, and a time frame and voting procedure was adopted which accommodates all AAUW CA members.

- Summer- Fall Nominating committee produces slate, and resolutions' committees determines if any resolutions are forthcoming, and public policy presents the <u>Priorities</u>.
- Nominations and resolutions published in Perspective with Preliminary ballot and voter guide
- April Additional nominations accepted up to the close of the first business session of the annual meeting. No amendments to resolutions or Public Policy Priorities accepted. (Nominations and new resolutions will be accepted from the floor of the meeting)
- After Annual meeting Online Forum for debate/discussion of resolutions and Public Policy Priorities put on the state website.
- Within a week of the annual meeting, AAUW
 CA will post final voters guide on the website.
 Ballot will be finalized.
- May Ballots emailed and snail mailed and online voting activated and voting opens
- Deadline set for mailed ballots and online voting to be closed.
- Election results announced.

Gender Wage Gap Smaller in STEM Careers

A new U.S. Commerce Department report <u>found</u> that women in science, technology, engineering and mathematics careers experience greater economic parity with men. The department's Economic and Statistics Administration <u>report</u>, titled *Women in STEM: A Gender Gap to Innovation*, said women with STEM jobs made 33 percent more than women with non-STEM jobs in 2009; however, only 24 percent of women in the United States hold STEM careers. Engineering, which remains the most male-dominated STEM career, offers the lowest wage disparity between genders.

AAUW's 2010 research <u>report</u>, *Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics*, explored environmental and social barriers, including stereotypes and gender bias, that block women's participation in STEM. AAUW <u>supports</u> promoting and strengthening STEM education, especially for girls and other underrepresented populations. Efforts to reduce gender barriers will <u>help</u> increase America's competitiveness in these fields.

And did you know that a woman who works in the STEM fields with no college degree will usually earn 30 % more than a woman who teaches with a Master's degrees?
